The skill of reading aloud with proper intonation, phrasing, and expression.

Why should we focus on Fluency?

Fluency is not an end in itself but a critical gateway to comprehension. Fluent reading frees cognitive resources to process the meaning of what is being read.

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Fluency, the ability to read words accurately and at a natural pace, is crucial for reading comprehension. Educators can foster fluency through

various methods:

- **Guided Repeated Reading:** Students reread passages with teacher support, building fluency and confidence.
- **Echo Reading:** Students read aloud after the teacher, imitating their prosody and intonation.
- **Partner Reading:** Students read aloud with a peer, practicing fluency and receiving feedback.

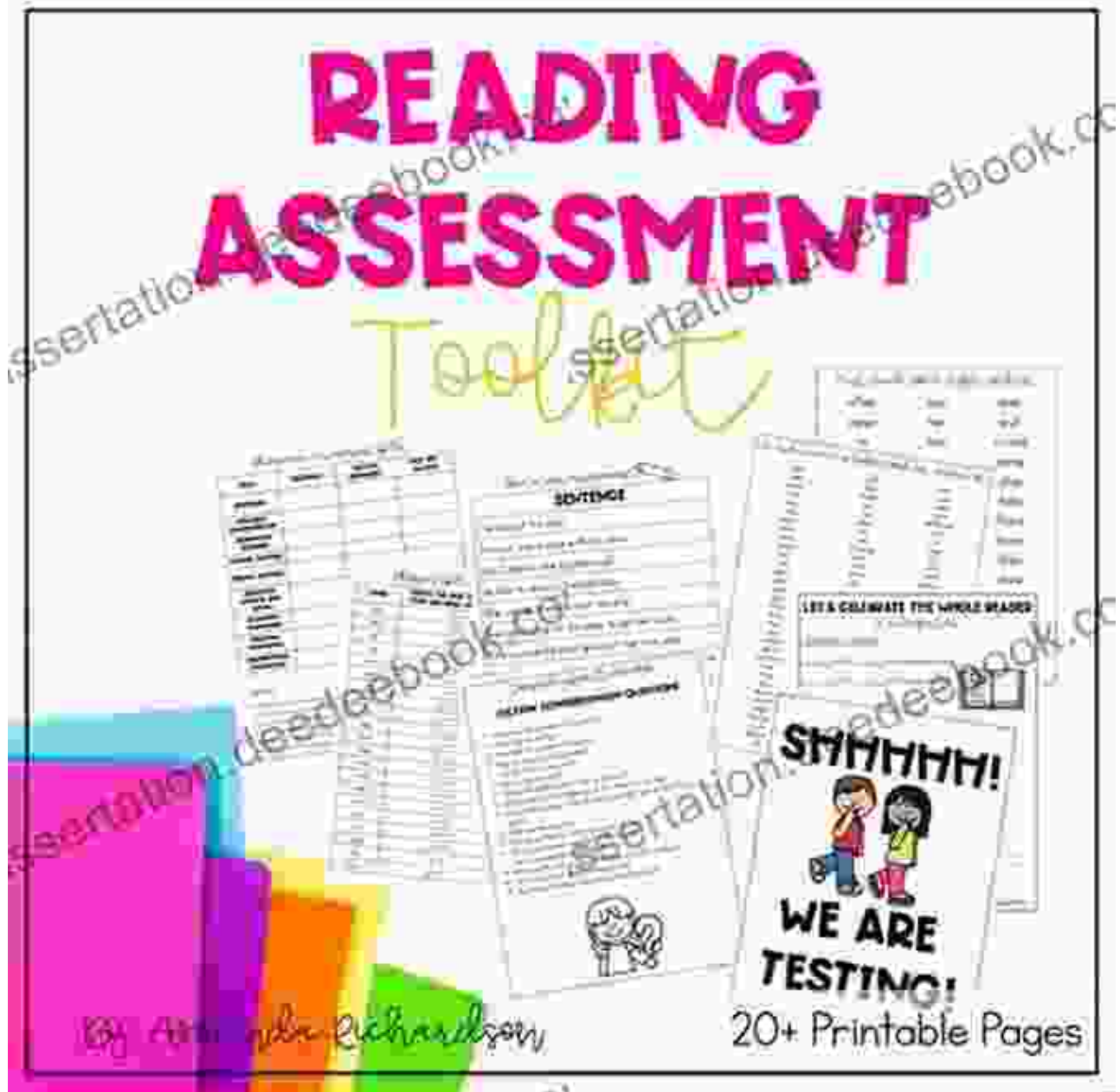
