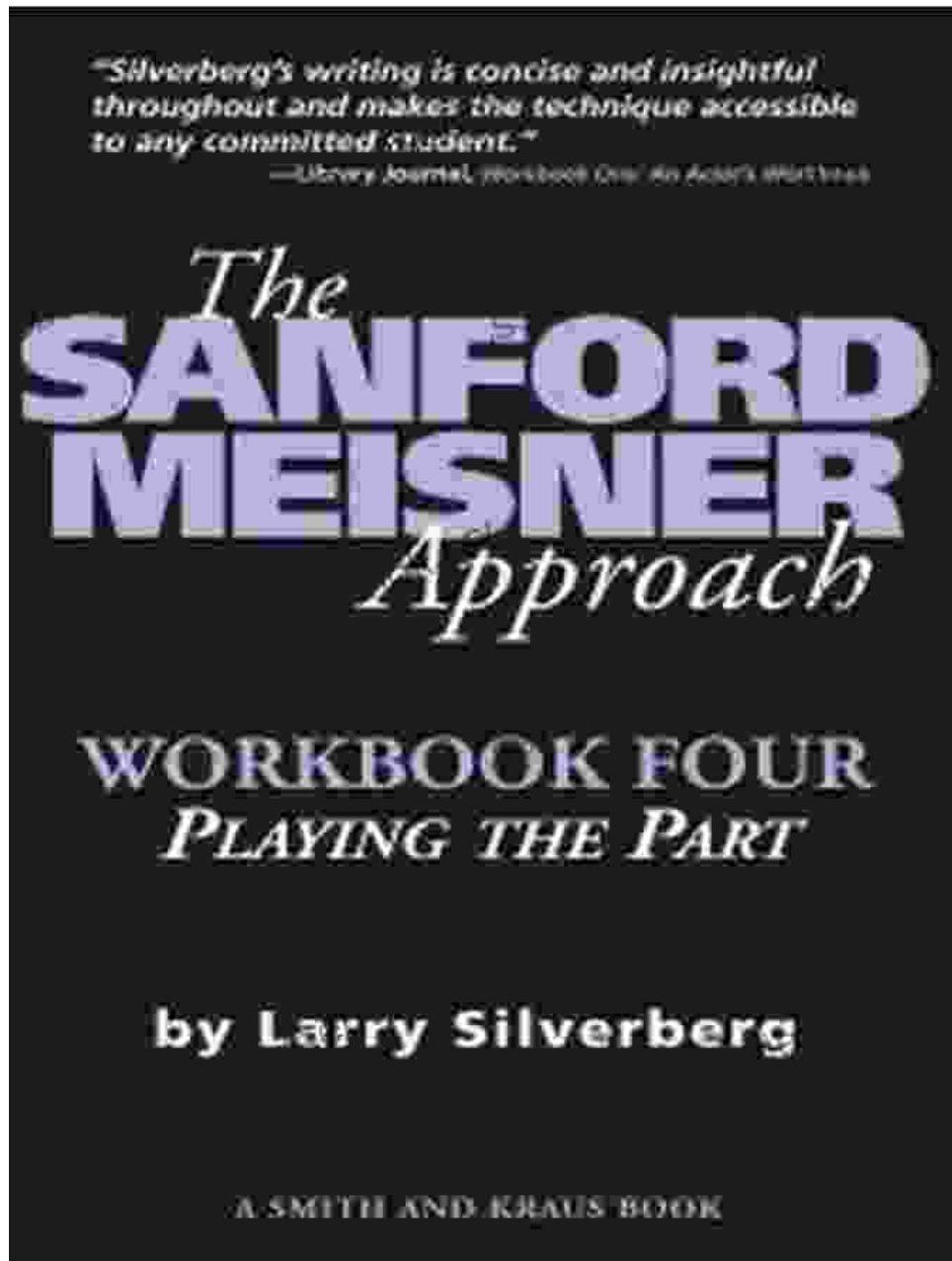


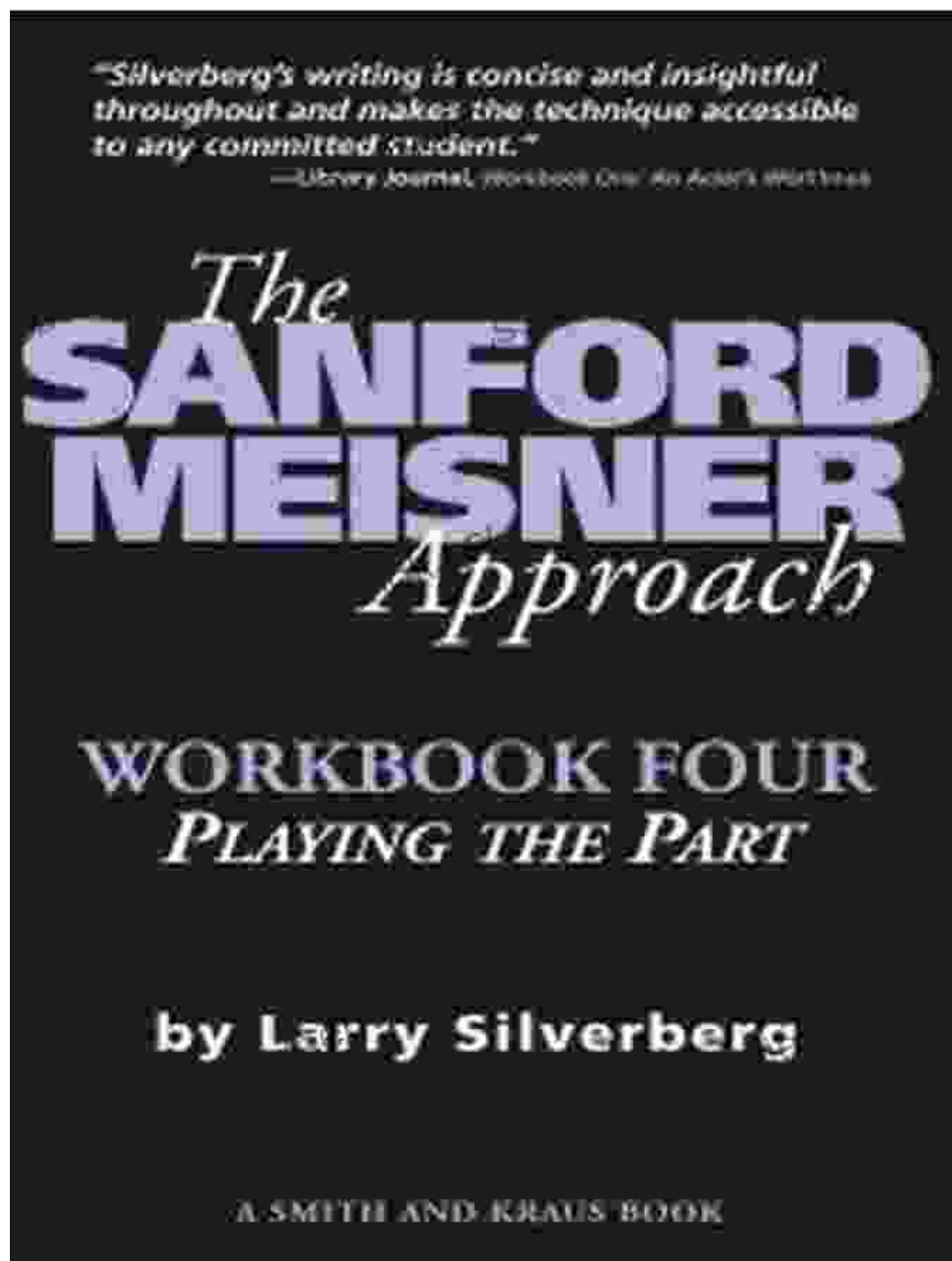
Image illustrating various vocal characterization techniques.

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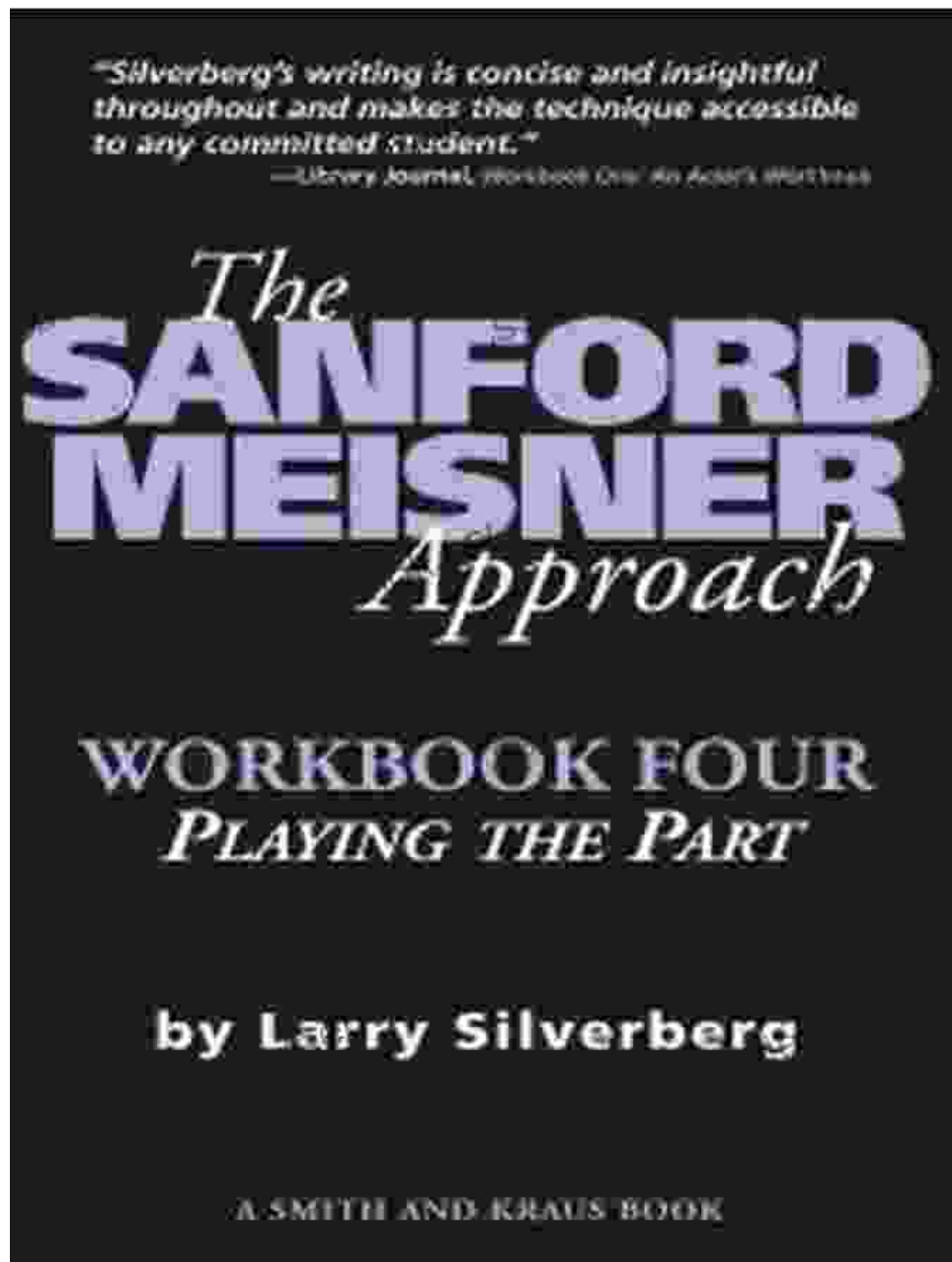

Reflection and Self-Assessment

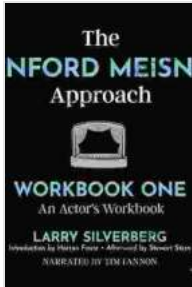
