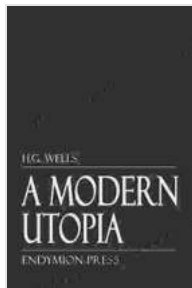

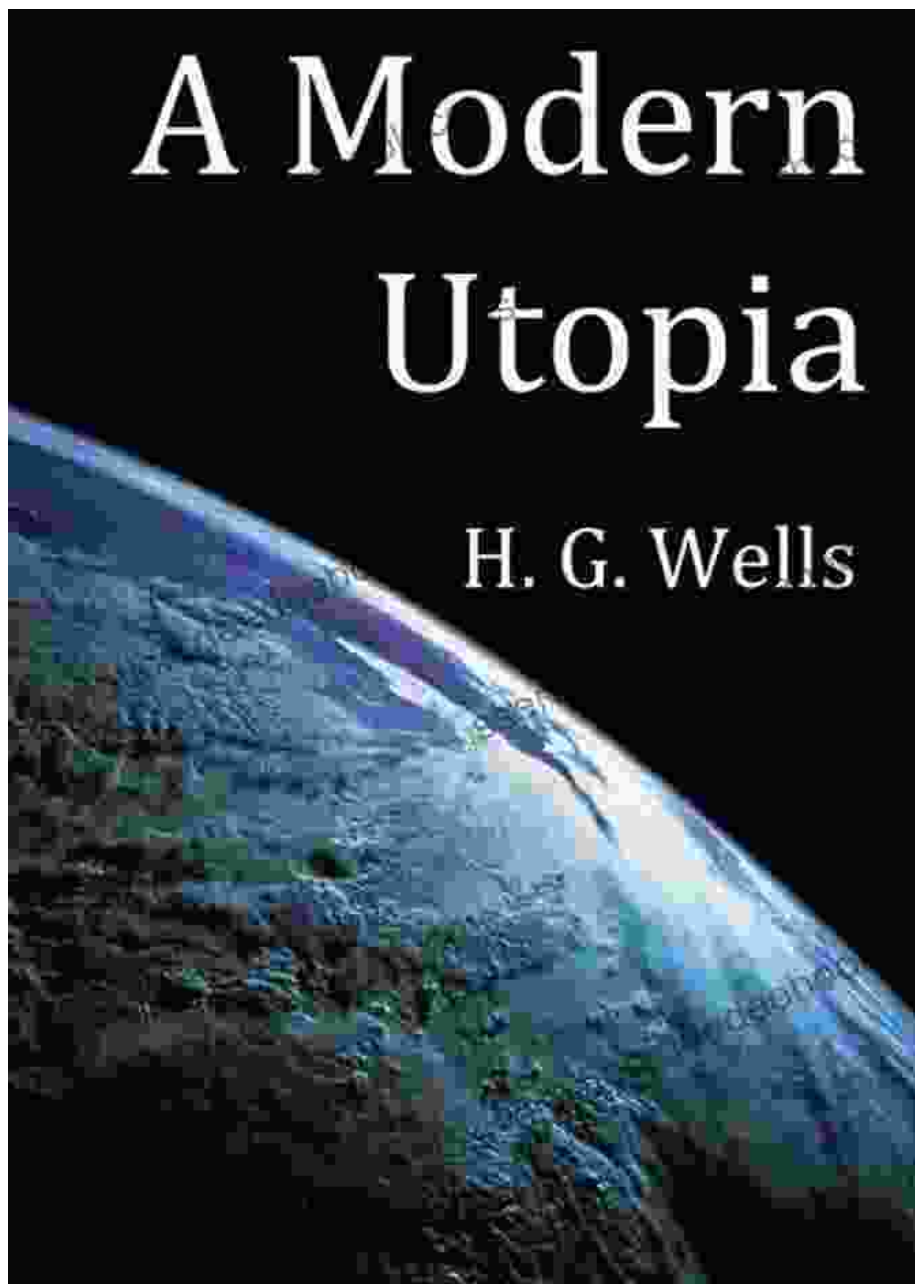
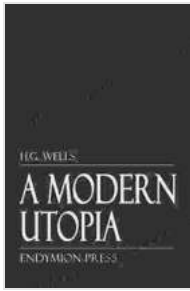


Image: Cover of "Modern Utopia" by H.G. Wells, published in 1905
